

## AP World History Chronology

Chronology is an important aspect to the understanding of history and it is an aspect of world history that is a weakness for many students. In order to help you improve your chronology skills, you will create a set of cards to use in a game called World History Chronology. If these cards are created thoughtfully, they should provide you with an invaluable study tool for the final exam and the AP World History test in May.

The requirements for your chronology cards are:

- Your group must make 100 cards
  - At least 20 cards from each of 5 AP World History units
- Must be on 3x5 index card
  - Date in the upper, left hand corner and a sentence identifying the event in the middle of the card. Every event should be a MAJOR event in the unit.
  - Each card must have *your* complete initials in the lower, right hand corner
  - Should be one date. **Dates CANNOT be a range of dates** (ex. 44 BCE – 476 CE) or a century (ex. 8<sup>th</sup> century)
  - All writing should be on one side of card. There should not be any writing on the back of card.
